MINISTER'S LETTER

The Global Village of 100 People



Thank you to all the people that contacted me following last month's editorial on counting our blessings. Several of you had visited the Eden Centre, and suggested that I look at the piece on global statistics where patterns of inequality are pictured as a global village of 100 people. With *Racial Justice Sunday* on the 12th February, the article provides us with much to meditate upon and I provide it for you here.

If the world's population was understood as a global village of 100 people:

- 60 would be Asian
- 14 would be African
- 11 would be European
- 09 would be South American
- 05 would be North American
- 33 would have no access to electricity
- 15 including 10 women, would not be able to read or write
- 18 would live on less than \$1 a day of whom 11 would be women and children
- 37 would have no access to a toilet
- 50 would live in an urban area of whom 15 would live in slums
- 13 would have no access to drinking water
- 10 would be disabled
- 14 would have no right to basic health services

- 02 would be born this year and 1 would die
- 09 would be under 5 years old
- 15 including 3 children, would be undernourished
- 06 would be infected with malaria
- 10 would die from tobacco related illness
- 20 richest would possess 90% of the wealth
- 15 would be overweight, 4 would be clinically obese
- 10 would be over 60 years old
- 24 would have access to the internet

Let us pray

We share a common earth. We stand among each other. We share our planet, We share birth, death, hunger, love.

The sky opens above us and we receive space. The earth stands beneath us and we receive ground. Living things die for us. And we die, returning to soil, sea, and air.



District Visit of the President of Conference

When the President of the Conference led Sunday morning worship at Oxlease Methodist Church in the St Albans and Welwyn Circuit, the congregation were delighted to welcome back one of their former ministers. Rev. Dr Roger Walton was minister at Oxlease Methodist Church in the 1980s until being appointed to serve in the then Division of Ministries. The congregation, which included numerous old friends, greatly appreciated Roger's imaginative leading of worship and accessible preaching style. Lively conversations continued over a splendid lunch prepared by members of the church's Zimbabwean fellowship.

Afterwards, the president visited nearby Birchwood Methodist Church, which is a very fine example of the way in which outdated church premises can be replaced by a compact and more suitable building, funded by the sale of part of the site for residential housing.

Later, at Hatfield Road Methodist Church in St Albans, the president addressed a circuit audience, providing clear and insightful answers about the contemporary mission and ministry of the Methodist Church in conversation with the Superintendent, Rev. Rosemary Fletcher, who drew on topical questions submitted by the audience. Following a welcome break for tea kindly provided by the church, the president preached at a lively circuit service led by circuit staff together with the worship band. In both morning and evening services, the president addressed the themes of holiness and justice in an engaging and inspiring way.

On the following day, the president travelled with the district chair to Clacton in the Tendring Circuit to meet with the ministers before visiting the Brooklands ward of Jaywick, which is among the most deprived communities in Britain. Here Deacon Janet Jenkins gave the president a tour of an area in which she exercises a ministry of befriending and supporting some of the most vulnerable people in society. Then it was back to Trinity Methodist Church in Clacton for the regular Monday 'grub club' run by the church where 'guests', many of them experiencing acute poverty and even homelessness, can enjoy a free hot meal served by volunteers. Over lunch, the president listened attentively to many of their stories, his warm and easy-going manner winning an appreciative response from those whose voices are often not heard let alone respected.

In a packed schedule, the president was soon being whisked away to High Leigh Conference Centre in Hoddesdon, where he led a retreat for those ministers in the Bedfordshire, Essex and Hertfordshire District in their first ten years of ministry. Again, the president skilfully combined his considerable theological, educational and pastoral gifts to lead a three-day ministerial retreat on 'Exploring Holiness and Justice'. Our ministers returned to their circuits having been well nourished spiritually and theologically, and greatly encouraged in their ministry. Everywhere he went, the president made new friends as a result of his personal grace and holiness.

As a church we have just celebrated Christmas, when we gave our thanks and expressed our joy for the coming into the world of Christ as our saviour and friend. We were focussed on the beginning of a new life and the possibilities it presented. We were looking forward to the way in which the Lord would grow to teach us about the right way of living and also remembering his ultimate sacrifice for us.

As we start a new year, we will also be hoping and praying that it will provide us with new blessings, especially if the last year had been a difficult one for us, or for our family and friends. However, it can sometimes be hard to see a way through our circumstances, whether be they illnesses, or suffering, or losses of any kind, and these burdens can seem overwhelming with any joy of Christmas being quickly forgotten. But, the enduring message of Christmas is that hope is there throughout the year! We should continue to look for and give out the message of goodwill, friendship, hope, caring and reconciliation. Christmas is not just for Christmas – it's for life!

We should continue to seek both God's help and forgiveness as a key to our healing. Our two way relationship with God through Jesus in prayer means we can ask for His help and then listen for His guidance in reply. Healing comes in many forms and may not always be quite what we were desiring or expecting, but it will ultimately come, even if it does not feel like it now. Our illnesses, or those of others for whom we may be caring or supporting, can leave us feeling burdened and uncared for. We may feel that we can do no more. We may resent being unable to fulfil our true potential. And yet, for all our difficulties, we are still blessed with life and hope, and far better provided for than many in the world. God will help us use our experiences to better understand how we can be part of the changes we wish to see.

We will need people for an hour or so on the Friday evening (5th May) to set up and from around 8am on Saturday morning to complete the set up and act as stewards and caterers - we provide tea, coffee & biscuits on arrival and soup and rolls and more tea & coffee at lunch time. Then of course we get to clear up after lunch!

I have already had one volunteer - thank you Frank - but I would like to get a team together so we can meet with the Rayleigh folk to plan. Anyone who is able and willing to help please let me know your names and contact details and I will call us together once we have met with the Synod Secretary in February.

The message for our homebased congregations in Leigh

Greetings to everyone reading this at home. I hope that you are keeping warm and feeling encouraged as the evenings slowly lengthen, and the snow drops can be seen in the garden. I also like to buy my first bunch of daffodils on the 1st February, to mark St Bridget's Day. Their vibrant colour cheers me on to remember that new life will come again.

From a church liturgical point of view, this month will end with *Transfiguration Sunday* on the 26th February. It is a sure sign that God's grace is at work, providing us with a foretaste of God's power and glory, that might sustain us through the more challenging weeks of Lent.

Psalm 96 is often chosen as the psalm for the day, calling everyone to joyful praise.

 1 O sing to the Lord a new song; sing to the Lord, all the earth.
 2 Sing to the Lord, bless his name; tell of his salvation from day to day.
 3 Declare his glory among the nations, His marvelous works among all the peoples.
 4 For great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised; He is to be revered above all gods.
 5 For all the gods of the peoples are idols, but the Lord made the heavens.
 6 Honor and majesty are before him; strength and beauty are in his sanctuary.
 7 Ascribe to the Lord, O families of the peoples, ascribe to the Lord glory and strength. 8 Ascribe to the Lord the glory due his name; bring an offering, and come into his courts.
9 Worship the Lord in holy splendor; tremble before him, all the earth.
10 Say among the nations, "The Lord is king! The world is firmly established; it shall never be moved. He will judge the peoples with equity."
11 Let the heavens be glad, and let the earth rejoice; let the sea roar, and all that fills it;
12 Let the field exult, and everything in it. Then shall all the trees of the forest sing for joy
13 before the Lord; for he is coming, for he is coming to judge the earth. He will judge the world with righteousness, and the peoples with his truth.

The Psalmist here, doesn't hold back, but seems to be providing a singing lesson. God is enthroned on high and not just the people but all the earth needs to respond in joyful singing. To recognise God's glory makes the earth sing with praise. It all reminds me of my Methodist Tutor at college, who when we were getting bogged down and side tracked by debate, would quote his short hand version of the Westminster Catechism, "What is the chief end of human life?" "To glorify God and enjoy God forever."

To do that, we don't have be running round completing the umpteenth task, infact that might get in the way. We can do it sitting in a chair, looking out into our world; through the people who visit; the radio we listen to or the TV we watch. The Psalmist also doesn't imagine you glorifying God alone. No, he pictures us joining with, *"the sea," "the fields," "and all the trees,"* praising God (verses 11-12).

The implications here are huge. As we go about our day, meditating and praising God, we are partners with all the people of the earth (verse 7) and with oceans, soil, trees and air, glorifying God together. It seems very clear that we are *all in this together*. Which reminds me of a reading we will find at the end of our Lenten journey, when Jesus is told by the religious leaders to keep his disciples quiet. He responds by saying that even if they do, the stones of the temple will shout out praises to God. For Jesus, even the stones sing the glorious praises of God!

So as you sit there, talking to people; looking into the garden, noticing the new signs of life beginning to emerge; catch the changing pattern of the sky and birds visiting the garden, remember that you are well placed to be singing this *"new song."*

And this "new song" recognises our partnership with all people and creation, and our responsibility and enjoyment to live in harmony with these partners in praise. As you learn the notes of that song, you could teach it to others as they call to see you!

May God bless you this month and remember, aside from *Songs of Praise* on the BBC, *The Sunday Service* is broadcast every Sunday on Radio 4 at 8.10am and there you will hear a complete service, including a sermon!
