## **Harvest**

This year, Wesley's Harvest Festival will take place on Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> October. During the service, we will be **collecting donations of tinned and long life food for Southend Foodbank.** Your donations for the foodbank are very gratefully received throughout the year, and are particularly pertinent at this time of year as we think of Harvest, and the foodbank tries to keep up with the need from our local community. If you are able to donate, really useful items to donate right now are: tinned tomatoes, instant mash, tinned mixed veg, tinned rice pudding, tinned fruit, 1kg bags of rice, plus strong carrier bags. As ever, thank you for all you are able to give.

In addition, at our Harvest Festival we will also be **holding** a retiring collection to support the work of local homeless charity Off The Streets. Off The Streets currently run a shelter 7 nights a week to support rough sleepers in Southend. Having opened at the start of March, they have helped 10 people into accommodation and 3 people find jobs. # Greenbelt 2025 - Hope in the Making For me Greenbelt is HOPE

#### **Thursday**

An easy journey with Bob and Anne Briant. Greenbelt campers were getting organised, carting their tents etc from their cars to the campsite – a way bit off in the distance We were just getting our wrist bands and programmes - all very easy. Then a bite to eat at the Campsite Hub and of course a cup of tea. Refreshed and already pondering which events to go to for three whole days – onward to the Hotel. Meeting friends in the lobby, totally unplanned, lovely room and then a swim, evening meal and rest.

#### **Friday**

Hotel breakfast – fried bread – thank you, and off to Greenbelt. Talks, worship and workshops had already begun. People wanting to listen, learn, be involved, babies in carts and slings, toddlers running free on the grass, many mobility scooters; O so much freedom for all ages. A community, respectful, calm, safe, smiling in the sunshine all intentionally seeking 'something'

#### What are you seeking?

My first talk, in the Shelter tent, was with Miranda Threlfall-Holmes exploring the text in Ezekiel 37 and the Valley of the Dry Bones. She began explaining that there were just over 150 comments on HOPE in the Bible but not many on making hope. For this talk she had chosen the phrase 'our bones are dry, and we are hope less' For the first 35 chapters of Ezekiel the people are in exile, and their country lies wrecked, everything lacks hope. Ezekiel through vivid visions is challenged by God to speak out about all that they did wrong – to prophesy – a calling out, especially to their leaders, to turn to God. One vision is of the Valley of the Dry bones with the valley referring to Psalm 23. The bones do listen; they stand together like a community having lived through a trauma and are now becoming hopeful. By coming together, telling our stories - sometimes wrestling with them we can become more hopeful.

Miranda then gave us an activity to do. There were probably about a 100 people in the TENT called SHELTER. We were to create a Haiku (a Japanese poem of 3 lines and 17 syllables) In small groups we were to create/choose a first

line of 5 syllables and write it on one 'post it' note, a second line of 7 syllables and put it on a second 'post it' of a different colour and finally the third line of 5 syllables on the third coloured 'post it'. Once done we placed them on the 3 edges of the small, raised stage at the front of the TENT. One of the group then chose another 1 line from the edge of the stage to take back to the group. I offer you 2 examples

Valley of Dry Bones

Put breath in you, you shall live

We have a future

Mortal, can bones live?

Thus says the Lord to the bones

Join with HOPE we live

Wonderful, I was back at Greenbelt learning and being involved in Worship.

Next onto Remembrance for Peace with Wild Goose (part of the Iona Community) and CND. A short talk and then over to the gathered group to come up with ideas for Remembrance services: Poppies – red, white, black and purple; friendship bracelets, world map and candles on areas of conflict and the importance of personal stories. As I am taking the Remembrance Sunday at Wesley this year you may get one or all of these.

Still with Wild Goose a panel of 4 people in their twenties and thirties discussing 'The Church I never knew I was looking for?'. Their attendance and love of their church was encouraging.

With my brain needing a rest, 'Grace Notes' was next. A jazz ensemble offering gentle movement and music to reflect the scriptures - wonderful. Continuing the relaxed mediation theme I took a walk through a labyrinth on the grass.

Getting on for 5pm so to the Tiny Tea Tent. Fill up my flask and survey the eateries – a roast pork burger will do. Sat listening to the 'Xcerts' – a little loud and not really my music. Then, a slow walk to the car and back to the hotel.

#### **Saturday**

Back with Miranda Threlfall-Holmes exploring Exodus chapter 5 – bricks made without straw. This needs quite a lot of explanation, so I am going to offer this for the November Clarion. The second half she led us through corporately composing a Psalm – really inclusive – maybe I will try this in a service

In the pagoda tent I sat listening to the actor Adjoa Andoh, best known as *Bridgerton's* Lady Danbury. Adoja is a Christian and has had a very interesting journey into acting. She is a member of the Church of England and here are just a couple of quotes I hope I have got correct: - 'God meets us where we are' and God is better than a fag!' We need to remember that every day is a miracle, and we are all capable of being a light for those around us. So very hopeful

Next to a service by the Magdalene Community Church – a church that is always outside regardless of the weather, with all ages especially young children and families. Glad it was sunny but most of us were in the shade. It was a joy to watch the toddlers and the relaxed manner of the parents.

Leaders' voices had to be loud (with no microphones) so, they were not always clear, but no matter, the message of God's love was clear.

Then a trip to the Tiny Tea Tent followed by a talk by Charlotte Gale about setting up a 'new' church in a former bookshop in Coventry Cathedral, being self-sufficient, inclusive, small and varied. Again, this was encouraging that people were coming to faith in our modern busy world.

Another trip to the Tiny Tea tent for dinner, listening to the wonderful 'The Longest Johns' singing folk sea shanties – a joyous fun time for me – jigging about, clapping and having a feel-good time for about an hour before beginning to think about the hotel and some well-earned sleep.

#### Sunday

Communion for all, sat at the main stage with about 15,000 people believing and worshipping together in sunshine. The communion is all about inclusivity and this year was no different. We were led by Ezra Solanky – a 10-year-old Greenbelter, and an 82-year-old, Rev Sue Parfitt. She was one of the first women to be ordained as a priest in the

church of England and is possibly about to be charged with terrorism for supporting the banned Palestinian group. Other supportive organizations were Two:23, Symphony Collective and St Columba's Church, Oxford.

We began with a traditional hymn of 'Great is thy faithfulness' and then to a not so well-known John Bell song 'Christ's is the world in which we move' with a lovely refrain:

To the lost, Christ shows His face To the unloved, He gives His embrace To those who cry in pain or disgrace,

Christ, makes, with His friends, a touching place

After prayers and readings, we were in groups of 10-12 to offer each other communion of bread and wine - Ribena – intergenerational, friends and strangers – silence, peace, joy and fun.

There is always a collection and this year it was 50% to Greenbelt to organise next year and 50% is to go to the relief and restoration projects in Gaza though the charity Christian Aid. Although I did not get to a tent/stage called the 'No Fly Zone', this was where discussions on the Holy

Land took place. An art installation, the 'Gaza Lighthouse' stood shining a light for the Holy Land and the Palestinians throughout the festival.

After the communion I went to a talk by Ruth Harvey at Wild Goose entitled Hope in every Breath. This was very informative and scriptural but in discussion and feedback the most memorable comment was that there is more good than badness inside us and that brings HOPE. This was encouraging us to make as many acts of kindness as we could as this offers others HOPE.

The weekend was coming to an end and I had not even been to the 'Hope and Anchor' – a tent organised by the Methodists. Dropped in, chatted to old friends and then to the bookshop tent. Yes, it is a good resource and of course had to buy some books.

Loaded up I began reluctantly to wander very slowly to the car. Definitely going back next year. Anyone want to join me?

# **Prayer at Wesley**

As Christians we pray, and sometimes non-church people ask us to pray for them. At Wesley we have a prayer board in the concourse area and a prayer table in the sanctuary. At both names or situations can be written and will be prayed for.

These invitations to request prayer do not seem to be as used as frequently as they once were. If you have any suggestions as to make them more visible or more available, please do tell me.

The vestry prayer book used in Sunday morning services and occasionally at other times began decades ago when we had a Saturday morning prayer meeting. Anyone who attended the meeting could offer or write names of people who had requested prayer or situations in need of prayer.

When it was suggested that this prayer book be used for the Prayer of Intercessions on Sundays two books emerged. One that remained private for the prayer group and one for all to hear when used on Sunday mornings. It is VERY IMPORTANT that those people in the book know their names will be read out. It is also helpful to know when names can be removed, as the list can simply become too long.

I do write the vestry prayer book, but anyone can offer names to myself or any member can put names or issues into the book providing the individual who is mentioned knows and agrees that they will be publicly prayed for on a Sunday morning.

For private prayer we do offer this after communion on the second Wednesday of the month. I personally am prepared to pray with anyone in our sanctuary, quietly over by the prayer table. If names are on the prayer table (tree/basket) or on the board in the concourse they will be prayed for.
